Under the Act of Congress of March 3, 1871, Washington, D. C.:

The Petition of John Nammard of the County

respectfully represents:

That he is a citizen of the United States and resides at present near  
Alma, in the County and State aforesaid

That he has a claim against the United States for Supplies taken  
from his horses, on which there resided, and at present  
Resides a situated near Long Run, in the State  
County of Page

as follows:

Total value of Property, ..... **✓ 259** **50**

That all the items in the above schedule were of the full value therein set for and were  
~~taken from~~ your petitioner for the use of and were used by the  
United States army ~~under the following Circumstances on the~~  
~~7th day of June 1862, as well as succeeded, by Genl. Shields~~  
~~Army and the advance in Port Republic they encamped~~  
~~within one mile of your Petitioners and took their camp~~  
~~Sheep butchering them and used them as food. They~~  
~~also took the Bacon charged for and on the Return~~  
~~of Genl. Shields Army from the Port Republic Battle, they~~  
~~encamped within two miles of your Petitioners and took~~  
~~from him the bacon charged for on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of June 1862~~  
~~and also the Rye Cigs and wheat charged for of~~  
~~that date~~

That no voucher, receipt or other writing was given therefor 32

That your petitioner resided at the time the said claim accrued where he at present resides

That he was the original owner of said claim, and that he is

the present owner of the same.

That your petitioner remained loyal adherent to the cause and the Government of the United States during the war, and was so loyal before and at the time of the taking of the property for which this claim is made.

That said claim has not before been presented to the Adjutant General of the Government

as you have been writing to me since and a great

the army would of taken apart it would not of hurt me

put me to a heap of trouble to get sum little of it back  
again at a time as I was a del to get it and in a short  
time after that my house burnt down and lost  
nearly all I had, so I havent got half of that back yet  
and never expect as I havent been able to work

\*This oath must be made in writing. The claimant should copy it in his own handwriting, and subscribe and swear to it before the clerk of a court of record, who should attach his seal; or if administered by any other officer, the official character of such officer should be certified to by the clerk under the seal of the court. If the claimant cannot write, some one else should write it for him, and he should then attach his mark, witnessed by two persons, and the officers swearing MUST certify that the contents were read over, explained to, and understood by him, before so making his mark.
